



Chromebook Care

Students in grades 3-12 have had the opportunity to use Chromebook devices to complete class work during our school closure. If you have a Chromebook in your home, please make sure you are taking proper steps to keep it in good condition. Always make sure to keep food and beverages away from the device – Chromebooks are not waterproof. Keyboards can easily be damaged by crumbs and dust that fall between the keys – please make sure they are staying clean.

There have been many system updates by Google for the Chromebooks. Please make sure the device is updated properly. To do so, go under the "three dots" menu in the upper right corner of the Chrome browser. Choose the "Help" menu, and select "About Google Chrome". This will bring a window open on the screen which will allow you to check for and install updates. Note: Many major updates from Google require the device to be restarted to finish installing – make sure the Chromebook is shut down completely or restarted at least once a week.



Tips for Online Learning

It is much easier to get distracted during the learning process when the instruction occurs outside the classroom. Below are some ideas for maintaining focus and experiencing success:

- Check the announcements on our school website each day to keep track of scheduled live classes and other important information
- · Create a list of important due dates to keep track of upcoming assignments
- Try to find a quiet location for schoolwork turn off the television, music, etc.
- Make it a priority to attend any live classes scheduled online
- Avoid distractions put phones or other computerized devices away during work, unless required for an assignment
- Set a timer to allow a specific amount of time to devote to a task, and allow for a short break before resuming work
- Communicate clearly to a teacher with details if there is confusion or a problem completing a task
- Set a regular schedule for doing work, and stick to it following a routine is essential
